YOUR DEGREE TIMELINE

Keewatinase — Department of Indigenous Education at Lakehead University offers **two unique opportunities** for individuals with Indigenous ancestry to become a teacher in a supportive environment. Our undergraduate programs combine in-class learning with experiential community-based learning opportunities to develop the knowledge and skills to teach Indigenous and non-Indigenous students.

YEARS 1 - 3

Undergraduate Degree program (3-years)

Undergraduate Degree Program(s)

Honours Bachelor of Education (HBEd) Indigenous Teacher Education

Primary/ Junior Division

This three-year program prepares future teachers to meet the educational needs of primary and junior students (Kindergarten to grade 6) while addressing the elements of Indigenous cultures, worldviews, and languages.

Students in the HBEd program complete a threeyear undergraduate degree <u>blended with the twoyear Bachelor of Education Professional program</u> for a total of five years.

- Students in the undergraduate degree complete courses in the following subjects: Education, Indigenous Learning, English, General Sciences, and Ojibwe, Oji-Cree and/or Cree.
- In addition to coursework, students complete an Honours Project in their fourth year that demonstrates their learning in a format of their choice.

Bachelor of Arts/Bachelor of Education (BA/BEd) Indigenous Learning Major

Intermediate/ Senior Division

This three-year program prepares future teachers to meet the educational needs of intermediate and senior students (Grades 7 - 12) while addressing the elements of Indigenous cultures, worldviews, and languages.

Students in the BA/BEd program complete a threeyear undergraduate degree <u>followed by a two-year</u> <u>Bachelor of Education Professional program</u> for a total of five years.

- Students in the BA/BEd program have a first teachable of Indigenous Learning and then choose their second teachable subject that is appropriate to the intermediate and senior level.
- Students complete courses in the following subjects: teachable subject, Indigenous learning, Education, English, & Cree, Oji-Cree or Ojibwe.



Teacher Education program (2-years)

Teacher Education Program

Bachelor of Education Professional

(Years 4 & 5 of both Undergraduate Degree Programs)

This two-year program (years 4 and 5) focuses on educational theories, practices, and abilities, providing students the knowledge and experience to be an effective educator.





Indigneous Language Teacher Diploma (ILTD)

The Indigenous Language Teacher Diploma (ILTD) program provides fluent speakers of Algonquian languages (Ojibwe, Cree, or Oji-Cree) with the skills and credentials to teach Native Language as a Second Language in primary/secondary schools in Ontario.

Upon successful completion of the ILTD program students will be recommended to the Ontario College of Teachers.
