Programs that meet your needs

We offer programs for Indigenous students that provide the necessary knowledge and skills to be a successful teacher. Our programs focus on Indigenous cultures, traditions, and practices in a Canadian context to ensure that you and your future students can share knowledge in a way that is effective and meaningful. Many of our programs use experiential learning methods, which give you an opportunity to learn outside of a conventional classroom.

Working Towards your Goal

All our undergraduate degree programs can lead to certification by the Ontario College of Teachers (OCT), meaning you will be able to teach in both community-operated (federal) and provincial schools.

As well as being registered with the OCT, you will also earn an undergraduate degree in a teachable area and a Bachelor of Education degree. These qualifications are necessary to be a teacher, but can also lead to other career and educational opportunities.



What is Indigenous Education?

Indigenous Education is the study and practice of teaching, which focuses on Indigenous languages, values, and traditions. We use a multidisciplinary approach to provide you with the knowledge and skills to teach both Indigenous and non-Indigenous students; our programs address the academic, cultural, and traditional needs of Indigenous students, educators, and communities

Interested in Indigenous Education?

Students interested in Indigenous Education will learn the following:

- A comprehensive understanding of pedagogical practices as they relate to teaching Indigenous and non-Indigenous students
- The ability to plan and teach a lesson that applies to many different learners
- A better understanding of Indigenous language, culture, and practices as they relate to education and teaching
- The capacity to use Indigenous languages to communicate with students or other learners



YOUR DEGREE TIMELINE

Keewatinase – Department of Indigenous Education at Lakehead University offers **two unique opportunities** for individuals with Indigenous ancestry to become a teacher in a supportive environment. Our undergraduate programs combine in-class learning with experiential community-based learning opportunities to develop the knowledge and skills to teach Indigenous and non-Indigenous students.

YEARS 1 - 3

Undergraduate Degree program (3-years)

Undergraduate Degree Program(s)

Honours Bachelor of Education (HBEd) Indigenous Teacher Education

Primary/ Junior Division

This three-year program prepares future teachers to meet the educational needs of primary and junior students (Kindergarten to grade 6) while addressing the elements of Indigenous cultures, worldviews, and languages.

Students in the HBEd program complete a three-year undergraduate degree *blended with the two-year Bachelor of Education Professional program* for a total of five years.

- Students in the undergraduate degree complete courses in the following subjects: Education, Indigenous Learning, English, General Sciences, and Ojibwe, Oji-Cree and/or Cree.
- In addition to coursework, students complete an Honours Project in their fourth year that demonstrates their learning in a format of their choice.

Bachelor of Arts/ Bachelor of Education (BA/BEd) Indigenous Learning Major

Intermediate/ Senior Division

This three-year program prepares future teachers to meet the educational needs of intermediate and senior students (Grades 7 - 12) while addressing the elements of Indigenous cultures, worldviews, and languages.

Students in the BA/BEd program complete a three-year undergraduate degree *followed by a two-year Bachelor of Education Professional program* for a total of five years.

- Students in the BA/BEd program have a first teachable of Indigenous Learning and then choose their second teachable subject that is appropriate to the intermediate and senior level.
- Students complete courses in the following subjects: teachable subject, Indigenous learning, Education, English, & Cree, Oji-Cree or Ojibwe.

YEARS 4 & 5

Teacher Education program (2-years)

Bachelor of Education Professional

(Years 4 & 5 of both Undergraduate Degree Programs)

This two-year program (years 4 and 5) focuses on educational theories, practices, and abilities, providing students the knowledge and experience to be an effective educator.

Anishinaabemowik is an umbrella for Indigenous language programs. Situated within Keewatinase Department of Indigenous Education, we **support Indigenous languages regionally and nationally**. Indigenous Language Teacher Diploma (ILTD)

The Indigenous Language Teacher Diploma (ILTD) program provides fluent speakers of Algonquian languages (Ojibwe, Cree, or Oji-Cree) with the skills and credentials to teach Native Language as a Second Language in primary/secondary schools in Ontario.

Upon successful completion of the ILTD program students will be recommended to the Ontario College of Teachers.
