Achievement Program

The Lakehead University Achievement Program recognizes the impact of early outreach and a postsecondary education has on the life of an individual, and we are committed to removing barriers to access education for students. Through the Achievement Program we want students to believe that post-secondary education is a possibility for them. Through yearly programming in schools, on campus and in the community, students starting in grade 4 can earn first year tuition to Lakehead University once they graduate high school. The Achievement Program currently has 380 students across five school boards in Northwestern Ontario.

On May 10, 2024 the Achievement Program hosted one of five Day on Campus events where students come to campus to participate in sports and recreational programming with Athletes and our ActiveU team in Athletics, along with exploring campus through hands-on educational and cultural programming with our faculty and staff. It was incredibly special for her to see the growth of this program and for her to share her wisdom and knowledge with the students.

Government of Canada Supports Lakehead University for their project to assist underserved populations in receiving palliative care services

\$2.38 million in funding will support improving access and facilitating system change for underserved populations

Marcus Powlowski, Member of Parliament for Thunder Bay-Rainy River, on behalf of the Honourable Mark Holland, Minister of Health, announced \$2.38 million in funding over four years to Lakehead University for their project: Improving Access and Facilitating Systems Change for Palliative Care Among Underserved Populations. The project lead by **Dr. Lynn Martin** will provide a better understanding of which services are being received by these populations in order to identify gaps and improve access. In addition, the project intends to improve the experience of palliative care by developing data and resources for individuals, caregivers, and providers for multiple underserved populations. The project will have the guidance of advisory committees composed of persons with lived experience and organizations that represent them.

Lakehead welcomes international scholar as endowed Chair in Finnish Studies

Lakehead University is pleased to announce the appointment of **Dr. Jarmo Peltola** as the next endowed Chair in Finnish Studies.

An associate professor and senior researcher in economic and social history at the University of Helsinki, Dr. Peltola is the 12th Finnish scholar to hold this position. He will hold the position from September 2024 until the end of April 2025. In addition to providing lectures at the undergraduate level and conducting research, he will participate in the intellectual life of the university and the Finnish community and explore the development of partnerships.

Prior to joining the University of Helsinki, Dr. Peltola spent 13 years as a senior researcher at the University of Tampere. He has also been a visiting researcher at Umeå University and Uppsala University in Sweden and at the International Institute of Social History. Dr. Peltola's publications include 18 monographs and 36 articles/book chapters exploring a wide range of Finnish economic, labour, and social history.

Established in 1996, the Chair in Finnish Studies is an endowed appointment at the Thunder Bay campus created and sustained by the generous support of the Finnish community of Thunder Bay and its organizations, particularly the Canadian Suomi Foundation.

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Groundbreaking Dog DNA Test Uncovers Breed Ancestry From a 40-Year-Old Canine Tooth

In a white paper envelope on **Stephen Fratpietro's** desk are three teeth that once belonged to a dog named Thor. The teeth, now well over 40 years old, await DNA analysis at Lakehead's Paleo-DNA Laboratory as part of a groundbreaking test from canine genetics testing company, DNA My Dog. In fact, the Paleo DNA Laboratory was specifically designed to test old and degraded DNA samples, making them uniquely equipped to perform these tests. After successfully extracting DNA from a 2,000-year-old mummified human hand, analyzing DNA from a 40-year-old dog tooth is a walk in the park for Fratpietro and the Paleo-DNA team. The only commercially available test of its kind, the Deceased Dog DNA Test is made possible by the partnership between DNA My Dog and the highly accredited Paleo-DNA Laboratory. The two have been in partnership for well over a decade and have since provided closure and insight to dozens of pup parents around the world.

But teeth aren't the only type of sample Lakehead and DNA My Dog can test. Ideal samples include items the dog has had oral contact with (that haven't been washed or used by another dog) and biological samples like teeth, blood, and nails. The Paleo-DNA Laboratory has successfully extracted DNA from: Toys (20+ years old), Collars, Pieces of fabric from dog bedding, sweaters, etc., Vomit, Feces, Teeth, Toenails, Scabs, Blood on blood card or medical syringes and Organs/tissue.

Upon purchase, customers will be sent detailed instructions on how to send their samples of choice. Up to three samples can be sent for analysis, and items will always be returned upon request. Results are available online roughly two weeks after the sample is received at Lakehead's laboratory in Thunder Bay, ON. Additional information can be found [here](#).

DNA My Dog is a Canadian-owned and operated company that has been providing DNA testing services for dogs since 2008. The company provides a range of tests including a Canine Allergy Test, Essential and Premium Breed ID tests, and a patent-pending Genetic Age test that provides a dog's accurate biological age.

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Lakehead researchers secure SSHRC grants for innovative social projects

Seven researchers at Lakehead University have received \$220,000 in grants from the Social Sciences and Humanities Research Council (SSHRC) for research topics ranging from food systems policy to intergenerational mobility and economics.

Dr. Idevania Costa in the School of Nursing will receive a \$64,964 Insight Development Grant for the project, “Digital Storytelling: A Tool for Promoting Critical Reflection, Advancing Inclusivity and Creating Trauma-Informed Wound Care”.

Dr. Sonia Mastrangelo, Faculty of Education (Orillia Campus), will receive a Partnership Engage Grant worth \$24,900 for her project, “The Applied Self-Regulation Knowledge Network Partnership: Improving Well-Being Among University Students”.

Dr. Costa's project will use digital storytelling (DST), which comprises arts-based visuals such as collage, photovoice and/or ebooks, for education and health promotion as a component of narrative therapy to support individuals and families in telling their stories.

Dr. Mastrangelo's project continues her work with the Applied Self-Regulation Knowledge Network (A.S.K.) to improve outcomes for university students who experience mental health challenges in the wake of COVID-19. A return to in-person learning has been a difficult transition for many students. The long period of isolation resulted in difficulties with emotion regulation, time management, group work, and overall university-life engagement.

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Sidney Howlett Receives Lakehead Leader Recognition Program Award

The Lakehead Leader Recognition Program was established to acknowledge exceptional students who have made valuable contributions within the university and beyond. **Sidney Howlett** (MEd student with a specialization in Environmental and Sustainability Education) has been named a Lakehead Leader for her contributions in the areas of Academic Excellence and Sustainability.

Nominated by her supervisor, **Dr. Ellen Field** (Assistant Professor, Orillia), Sidney's nomination letter indicated that she has "maintained an A+ average in her MEd program. She is an active member of clubs and committees, [and] contributes to research on climate change education at Lakehead" with co-authored reports and journal papers, while also presenting at events and conferences.

The nomination letter also notes that Sidney "is on the inaugural Mental Health and Climate Change Alliance's Youth Advisory Board. She is a contributor and program advisor for the Climate Action Accelerator Program and has started a consulting business for school boards (**Sidney Howlett Consulting**). Sidney has advanced climate action in Canada's education sector through her valuable contributions to research classroom guest speaking engagements, public lectures and volunteer work relating to sustainability issues, such as supporting youth eco-anxiety or addressing plastic waste. Through her personal and professional endeavours, she is creating a more beautiful, resilient world."

Bursaries provide opportunity of a lifetime for two Lakehead students

Two Lakehead University students will have a once-in-a-lifetime opportunity to live and learn in Italy this summer thanks to the Institute of Italian Studies at Lakehead University (IISLU).

Third-year political science student **Michael Fayrick** and second-year concurrent education student **Rhapsody Shepard** have each received a \$2,000 bursary from the IISLU. This bursary will allow them to participate in a transformative four-week program in Siena, Italy in May, organized by the University for Foreigners of Siena in collaboration with Lakehead International.

The program offers students from diverse backgrounds a unique opportunity to immerse themselves in Italian language and culture through structured language study, extracurricular activities, and excursions.

For Fayrick, a third-generation Italian Canadian, this is the opportunity to discover more about his heritage and culture. “My mother’s side of the family came to Thunder Bay from Italy so having the opportunity to go abroad to learn about my culture and the language is going to be awesome.”

Shepard always wanted to learn as many languages as possible. Initially quite shy, learning languages allowed her to feel like part of a community but also allowed her to keep a sense of independence.

Mark Piovesana, president of the IISLU, said the Institute is pleased to partner with Lakehead International to offer this opportunity to students.

According to James Aldridge, Vice-Provost, International, global mobility programs, such as the one in collaboration with the University for Foreigners of Siena, help students build critical global and intercultural competencies.

Lakehead and Confederation College collaborate on two in-demand health care pathways

Confederation College and Lakehead University have signed an agreement that allows students who complete an Honours Bachelor of Kinesiology or Bachelor of Kinesiology degree to receive advanced standing in the college's Paramedic or Medical Radiation Technology diploma programs.

Shane Strickland, Dean of Health, Negahneewin, and Community Services at Confederation College, emphasized the strategic design of the Paramedic program to address the immediate needs of Northwestern Ontario. "This program not only meets the urgent demand for paramedics in the region but also incorporates vital field experience, allowing students to gain hands-on learning in real medical situations," said Strickland. Highlighting the program's significance, Strickland noted that it is recognized as a priority by the Government of Ontario, with students eligible for the Ontario Learn and Stay Grant, which covers the cost of tuition and books for students who commit to serving in the region post-graduation.

The Medical Radiation Technology program, similarly, stands out with its Accreditation Canada seal of approval, preparing students for the **Canadian Association of Medical Radiation Technologists (CAMRT)** certification exam. Successful graduates find rewarding careers in diagnostic imaging across hospitals, clinics, and various medical settings. "Our programs are meticulously designed to ensure graduates are not just qualified but are ready to excel in their professional roles," Strickland added.

Lakehead University kinesiology graduates will be well-positioned to seek a career in both health program areas.

Lakehead partners with the Town of Innisfil to host South Simcoe Innovation Week

The Town of Innisfil and Lakehead University hosted the first ever Lakehead University South Simcoe Innovation Week from April 30 to May 2, in partnership with Nottawasaga Futures, the Town of Bradford West Gwillimbury and the County of Simcoe. The event, funded in part by the County of Simcoe Entrepreneurial Innovation Fund, brought together entrepreneurial thinkers from across Simcoe County to access business and innovation oriented workshops and events.

The inaugural initiative will include an Adaptive Leadership and Design Thinking Workshop for business leaders who are looking at helping their teams incorporate entrepreneurial practices into their organization. A Business Model Canvas Workshop will support current or aspiring entrepreneurs capture their business idea in a simple yet structured business plan which can be used as a foundation to build or scale a business. Experts from Lakehead's business accelerator, Ingenuity, will also host a student-only event at Nantyr Shores Secondary School to teach students about the entrepreneurial journey and engage them through an innovative competition.

This initiative aligns with Innisfil's new Economic Development Strategic Plan, and in particular supports the goal of building an innovative and investment ready business community. The purpose of South Simcoe Innovation Week is to connect entrepreneurs with supports like those available at Lakehead's Ingenuity business accelerator and showcase the expertise available through Lakehead faculty and students. As part of the festivities Lakehead will update the community on valuable and innovative research taking place at Innisfil's Circle Park.

Research in Action: Towards healthy, equitable and sustainable food systems

An examination of the food systems in Thunder Bay and area has shone a light on the challenges as well as the opportunities of developing a healthy and equitable food system. While the Thunder Bay + Area Community Food System Report Card provided a snapshot of the situation over the last few years, the project's lead researcher sees it as another step in an effort to increase awareness and attract broader public interest on an issue that hits so close to home.

An analysis on the region's food systems first came out in 2015. **Dr. Charles Levkoe** was able to partner with the Thunder Bay + Area Food Strategy (TBAFS) for a follow-up thanks to a grant from the Social Sciences and Humanities Research Council and local donations. The resulting 79-page report was unveiled in 2023, tracking changes across seven major “pillars” or categories, including food access; forest and freshwater foods; infrastructure; and urban agriculture. (The report is available [here](#)) Siska originally joined the project as a student. Her duties included copy editing, draft reviewing and helping with promotion through social media and community presentations. She received a master of Environmental Studies degree last summer. Having worked with TBAFS as an intern in 2022-23, she moved into the co-ordinator position in September.

The inaugural report card from 2015 was the foundation for this latest effort, bringing community members and organizations together to discuss the food system in Thunder Bay and surrounding municipalities, what it looks like and the challenges it faces. Along with drawing on data from various government sources, Levkoe and his partners also knocked on doors to gather basic information, for example, how many community gardens are out there.

Maliheh Ghorbankhani was also involved in the project. As a master's student, she helped update the qualitative and quantitative data. And as part of her thesis research, she delved into the report's outcomes and interviewed both the participants and the users of the report card. One of the most important conclusions she drew from this work is the role played by different organizations and the diverse perspectives they bring to the table.

CIHR Accelerating Clinical Trials program propels Canada's first child mental health trials network

Federal funding has been announced for the Canadian Network for Child and Youth Mental Health Trials (CYMH Trials Network), a new network to support clinical research that aims to improve mental health care for children nationwide.

Mental health challenges remain a serious health issue among Canadian youth. Seventy-five percent of mental health disorders emerge before age 25. At any given time, one in every eight children under the age of 18 years has a mental health disorder requiring specialized health services.

A research network for child and youth mental health clinical trials does not yet exist in Canada, unlike other high-income countries.

Local network lead, **Dr. Aislin Mushquash**, Associate Professor in the Department of Psychology at Lakehead University. The CYMH Trials Network will support high-quality, innovative clinical trials designed to improve mental health care for Canadian children and youth.

Guided by a team that spans 12 institutions and six provinces, including partnerships with national research and training networks and centres, the CYMH Trials Network boasts a nationwide presence. Funding support from the Accelerating Clinical Trials (ACT)/ Accélérer les Essais Cliniques (AEC) Consortium, totalling \$150,000, also underlines federal endorsement of the network.

This funding announcement marks an important first step in improving mental health treatments for children and youth. The network is also exploring partnerships with pharmaceutical companies and tech start-ups to build upon their findings and streamline medication access for families. Treatments developed through these partnerships could be put into a clinical care setting— allowing children and youth to access safe therapies vetted and formulated for their specific needs.

Dr. Mushquash will ensure that the needs of youth and community partners within Northwestern Ontario are reflected in the scope of the network. A key facet of the network is bringing together researchers, trainees, patient partners, Indigenous and community leaders, and decision-makers from across the country to improve child and youth mental health care.
