1. New Course Special Topics in Sociology

Justification

To create a 0.5 FCE course option at the first year that would be offered in the winter semester in order to support student retention and program completion. The course will appeal to transfer students who have already completed a half-course in first-year sociology at their previous institution, but who still need to complete an additional .5 FCE in order to move forward in their program. The course would also serve first year students who are starting in the winter term and have limited course options given the high number of full FCE 1000-level courses that are typically offered. Finally, the course would serve students who, for whatever reason, have had to drop a full-year 1000 course in the fall term and want to complete a half-course in the winter term so that they can limit the number of lost credits in their first year of study.
